4. Agenda Setting for Future Meetings

Item #1 - FWAC Ground Rules for Meetings

Ming Yeung of the Port provided ground rules and other information to start the meeting. This included the introduction of new rule that limits speakers to three minutes for comments or to ask questions. This is consistent with Port Commission policy for public comment.

Item #2 - Approval of Draft Meeting Notes

September 4, 2024 Meeting Notes were accepted by the FWAC without comment.

Item #3 – Quick Project Updates

A. Crab Season Update

The California Department of Fish and Wildlife ("CA DFW") determined that the crab season will not open on November 15th. Due to the continued presence of migrating whales. The CA DFW is set to decide on November 19th about a December 1st opening. It is possible the season will start December 15th but that assumes a small number of whales are present.

[Note, on November 21, 2024 the CA DFW announced that the crab season would not open December 1, 2024, due to the continuing presence of whales. CA DFW indicated there is a chance for a December 15th opening depending on the number of whales present in the crabbing waters and will reassess this option on or around December 5th].

• One question about who the controlling authority is. It is the California Department of Fish and Wildlife.

B. Hyde Street Harbor and Access Work

The Hyde Street Harbor project includes making general repairs and select utility upgrades at the fishing docks at Hyde Street Harbor. The general maintenance and repair work is almost complete. The contractor is working on installing new power pedestals with lights and upgrading the water lines. Substantial completion of the work is slated for late November/early December.

C. Fisherman's Wharf Dredging Update

The Fisherman's Wharf J-9 waterfront dredging is complete. The dredging was able to get to a depth of 12 feet in almost every area needed between J-9 and Scoma's. Roughly 8,000 cubic yards of dredge spoils were transported to Montezuma Slough in Solano County for beneficial reuse wetlands, which is a positive environmental contribution to wetland restoration in the Bay Area. In addition to the silt and mud, the dredgers discovered and removed approximately five tons of illegally dumped debris that accumulated over the last 20-30 years between the slips and in the fairway.

Port staff are preparing plans for dredging the inner lagoon and associated fairways in 2025.

Questions/Comments:

Question about timing and location of 2025 dredging work

 Answer – the 2025 dredging includes the fairway approach towards J9 and the inner lagoon. Port is sampling the bay floor and working on permits for that dredging season.

D. Wharf J9 Project Update

The J-9 float work was scheduled for substantial completion in mid-November; however, unforeseen complications with dredging, including significant debris removal, caused delays. The J-9 team began work on the float installation in early October, pushing slated substantial completion to early to mid-December, barring unforeseen complications.

During this phase of the float work, a portion of the timber deck at Wharf J-8, immediately adjacent to Scoma's, was observed to be sagging and barricaded for safety. Fortunately, the J-9 float contractor agreed to repair this section of wharf with new piles and a steel support beam. The repair work commenced without undue delay.

E. Fisherman's Wharf Little Embarcadero Activation

San Franpsycho, a uniquely San Francisco brand, commenced operating in a container adjacent to the sidewalk on the promenade. The pergolas and spinning chairs are active. The Welcome Center at the Plaza, housed in a container, will open soon and other containers are close to opening. There will be a photo booth and visitor information from custom openings in the container. Plans for lights on the Pier 43 ferry arch are advancing and installation should be soon.

The maintenance team and the Fisherman's Wharf CBD staff were thanked for their efforts. The CBD is working to install up to three ground murals in spring 2025. It was noted that a few street performer locations were slightly moved, and only one location was removed due to the activation efforts.

Ouestions/Comments:

o It was noted by several parties that the area is noticeably cleaner and is a great activation for the previously spare area.

F. Fisherman's Wharf Revitalized

In February 2023, the Port received an unsolicited proposal from Fisherman's Wharf Revitalized ("FWR") to redevelop portions of SWL 301 and Pier 45 Shed A at Fisherman's Wharf. After analysis and public feedback, this proposal was presented to the Port Commission in October 2023 resulting in the approval to execute an exclusive negotiating agreement ("ENA") with FWR. The ENA was signed in January 2024 which allowed FWR to solicit public feedback and refine the scope and specification of the project. In October 2024, the Port Commission endorsed a non-binding term sheet ("Term Sheet") for the project. There was public feedback at the

meeting including comments from the Fishing and Crabbing community and concerns from others, including neighborhood businesses, on using the spaces for other uses than a beverage garden and exhibit hall.

The Term Sheet outlines the key terms of the project and provides for higher level conceptual and development terms, including rent. It is more accurately described as a "guide" for the next steps and not a contract. The Term Sheet sets the rules and terms for how this development will occur, including refining the design of the project and environmental and regulatory reviews by multiple agencies. In addition to the reviews, the next stage will develop a design that delves into specifics and examine issues with construction impacts, transportation, and traffic.

This is at least a twelve-month process including community engagement throughout. Twelve months is aggressive timing and typically takes longer. The Term Sheet requires a San Francisco Board of Supervisors Budget and Finance Committee ("BOS") public hearing, which is tentatively scheduled for December 4, 2024 and if successful, a final vote by the full Board of Supervisors after that.

Questions/Comments:

- There was a comment on the audience at the Port Commission being at odds with approval of the Term Sheet as presented.
- There was a request for an "official channel" for more open forums for public comments other than FWAC meetings.
- There was a question about the timing of an EIR and community feedback and that it typically takes more than 12 months to finalize
 - Answer EIR, including community outreach and multiple discussions, cannot be submitted without approval from the BOS. Completion of an EIR is a material step before developers will commit to spending significant funds to advance the project.
- Request for the Port to be more transparent with its plans and how it shares its information regarding the project.
- There was discussion and explanation on formal and informal public comments.
- There was a comment on opportunity to address or comment on specific or big elements of the project.
 - Response These projects are very complex, particularly with the Port because of the costly infrastructure improvements required, including the seawall and pier substructure. Sometimes changing one component can have cascading effects across the entire project. It is too soon to discuss specific elements. Part of the opportunity to be more specific will come through design charettes as the project advances.
